## Keynote Speaker



### Dr. Daniel Siegel, MD

"Mindsight is the ability for the human mind to see itself. It is a powerful lens through which we can understand our inner lives with more clarity, transform the brain, and enhance our relationships with others".

Dr. Siegel's psychotherapy practice includes children, adolescents, adults, couples, and families. He is currently a clinical professor of psychiatry at the UCLA School of Medicine where he is on the faculty of the Center for Culture, Brain, and Development and the Co-Director of the Mindful Awareness Research Center. An award-winning educator, he is a Distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and recipient of several other honorary fellowships. He is also the Executive Director of the Mindsight Institute, an educational organization that focuses on how the development of mindsight in individuals, families and communities can be enhanced by examining the interface of human relationships and basic biological processes.

Dr. Siegel has published extensively for the professional audience. He is the co-editor of a handbook of psychiatry and the author of numerous articles, chapters, and the internationally acclaimed text, *The Developing Mind: Toward a Neurobiology of Interpersonal Experience* (Guilford, 1999). This book introduces the idea of interpersonal neurobiology and has been of interest to and utilized by a number of organizations, including the U.S. Department of Justice, The Vatican's Pontifical Council for the Family, Microsoft and Google, early intervention programs and a range of clinical and research departments worldwide. He has been invited to lecture for the King of Thailand, Pope John Paul II, and His Holiness the Dalai Lama. Dr. Siegel serves as the Founding Editor-in Chief for the Norton Professional Series on Interpersonal Neurobiology. His book with Mary Hartzell, M.Ed., *Parenting from the Inside Out: How a Deeper Self-Understanding Can Help You Raise Children Who Thrive* (Tarcher/Penguin, 2003) explores the application of this newly emerging view of the mind, the brain, and human relationships. His professional book, *The Mindful Brain: Reflection and Attunement in the Cultivation of Well-Being* (Norton, 2007), explores the nature of mindful awareness as a process that harnesses the social circuitry of the brain as it promotes mental, physical, and relational health.

**P1 Repairing the Damage - The Mother as the Key to Victim Well Being and Recovery**

Drawing from decades of research on child molesters and mothers of sexually abused children, this workshop will provide participants with evidence-based information grounded in the knowledge that mothers are the key ingredient to the child's well being and recovery. The workshop will address issues of reunification and consider contraindications, as well as explore the concept of restitution and making amends. It will address what a family needs to help the healing process and will examine how the W & I Code 355.1 can be used to protect children living with a registered sex offender. Participants will grapple with value systems and ethical issues during this workshop.

The use of the Containment Model of sex offender treatment and supervision has been highly successful in preventing or decreasing recidivism. The use of the polygraph is a significant factor in this model. This workshop will review the nature of polygraph in general; examine the new standards of polygraph testing and the nature of paraphilias. This comprehensive approach is a true containment approach which emphasizes a "No Secrets" approach to sex offender management.

**P5 Family Lovemap, Erotic Development and Sex Disorder**

Out of the seven Aggregates in the *MEGA*<sup>®</sup> ecological model, the *Family Lovemap Aggregate* showed the highest internal consistency reliability (0.749), signifying the importance of a Family Lovemap history. An individual's family's psychosexual history, or Family Lovemap, is intricately interwoven into the erotic development of the individual. Vandalized Lovemaps and other irregularities and/or anomalies (i.e. sex errors of the body); all contribute to later producing intimacy difficulties, sexual problems, sexual dysfunctions, and/or sex disorders (Paraphilia). Discussion of the following is part of this presentation: sexual deviancy; empirical findings on erotic development and its implications with regard to the specific psychological sex disorder; Paraphilia Disorder; and the much debated Paraphilia NOS.

## A1 An Interpersonal Neurobiology View of the Mind and of Mental Health

This interactive talk will examine two major questions: 1), "What is the Mind?"; 2), "How can we create a 'Healthy Mind'?" Dr. Siegel examines the interactions among the mind, the brain, and human relationships and explores ways to create a healthy mind, an integrated brain and mindful, empathic relationships. In this talk, we'll offer a working definition of the mind and practical implications for how to perceive and strengthen the mind itself - a learnable skill called "mindsight." Then, we'll build on this perspective to explore ways that the mind, the brain, and our relationships are influenced by experiences in psychotherapy and how they can be moved toward healthy functioning by examining various domains of integration that can be seen to be at the heart of well-being.

## B1 The Structured Risk Assessment: Treatment Needs Analysis

This presentation will provide an introduction and overview of the Treatment Needs Analysis (TNA) of the Structured Risk Assessment or SRA (Structured Risk Assessment Treatment Need Analysis Scoring Guide, Version 5.09). The SRA model integrates extant actuarial risk assessment instruments (such as the Static-99) with the identification of sex offender treatment needs. The TNA is the second in a four step process outlined in the SRA model. Specifically, the TNA identifies long term risk factors for recidivism that are used as targets for sex offender treatment. Relevant treatment issues include the identification of which long term risks/treatment needs exist, and the extent to which the individual has learned to manage them so as to avoid relapsing in situations that would have triggered a relapse in the past. In addition to the introduction and overview, a sample case will be scored.

## B2 So What Have You Done For Us Lately? Activities Of The California Sex Offender Management Board

After marking its one-year anniversary and delivering to the Legislature the required "Assessment" of the state's management of registered sex offenders, the California Sex Offender Management Board (CASOMB) has directed its efforts to beginning to address some of the most basic issues faced by those directing and implementing policies related to sex offender management. Some of the accomplishments and frustrations marking CASOMB activities will be described, projects directly related to those who provide assessment and treatment will be discussed and input will be solicited by CCOSO's two designated representatives to CASOMB.

## B3 Silent Injuries Among 1,033 Child Sexual Abuse Professionals

The four most commonly used constructs to describe cognitive, emotional and social health threats and subsequent sequelae among child sexual abuse professionals are *Countertransference*, *Burnout*, *Posttraumatic Stress Disorder* and *Vicarious Traumatization*. Analyzing 1,033 child sexual abuse professionals' anonymous responses to the Silent Injury Questionnaire revealed a single stressor: exposure to social and sexual deviance as it manifests within the child molester; is central to all four constructs. This workshop will discuss the relationship between exposure to social and sexual deviance and psychological and sexual health and research that shows that the greater one's exposure to deviance the higher one's Silent Injury score. This observation indicates exposure to social and sexual deviance is a significant stressor to professionals as they perform their professional responsibilities. The presenter will discuss administrative and personal health care practices that measurably reduce the risk of "Silent Injuries."

## B4 "Sexual Addiction" and Sexual Offending: A Growing & Dangerous Relationship"

Many sexual offender treatment programs were designed to address sexual offenders with deviant sexual interests, particularly that of Pedophilia. In large part due to the internet, illegal sexual activities have become increasingly available, and therefore many individuals who suffer from sexual addictions are committing sexual offenses when they might not have otherwise. This presentation will address the dynamics of "sexual addiction" and sexually compulsive behaviors, the interface between sexual addiction and sexual offending, and how these individuals' treatment needs may be similar and different to those sexual offenders compelled by a paraphilia. Female and juvenile sexually compulsive behaviors will be discussed as well.

## C1 A Prosocial Treatment Model for Sexually Abusive Youth: Theory, Practice and Research

This is a practical "how to" introduction to a Prosocial Model for treating sexually abusive juvenile offenders based on Aggression Replacement Training (ART). This Prosocial model identifies social skill, social reasoning, and emotional control deficits, as the primary treatable psychological risk factors for sexually abusive youth. The ART intervention is consistent with a "Good Lives Model" and is a strength-based approach that focuses on teaching Prosocial methods of achieving basic human needs in socially acceptable and rewarding ways. ART and similar models have multiple replications showing positive treatment outcomes with probation youth. The ART model was identified by Washington State as the most cost effective model for probation youth and is implemented there statewide. Dr. Ralph also presents his research on social reasoning deficits for probation youth that the ART model targets. The workshop will show how this Prosocial model can be used to complement other treatment approaches with Sexually Abusive youth. Results of a recent implementation of this treatment approach with sexually abusive youth in California outpatient and residential populations will be presented.

## C2 Communications between Members of the Containment Model: How a Supervising Officer, Treatment Provider and Polygraphist Communicate in 2010

With 58 counties and scores of treatment programs in California and, at this writing, only 13 polygraph examiners certified by the California Association of Polygraph Examiners (CAPE) to conduct Post Conviction Sex Offender Tests (PCSOT), how can we best communicate? This workshop will focus on the options of communications between the Polygrapher, Probation Officer, and treatment provider. Issues regarding denial, test preparation and the Containment Model will be discussed by a panel composed of a Polygrapher, Treatment providers and a Probation Officer.

## C3 Behavioral Treatment for Managing Sexual Arousal

## C4 Registration, Notification, Risk Assessment, and Sex Offender Management in California

Laws governing registered sex offenders, community notification, risk assessment and supervision of sex offenders are in a state of flux in California. ## D1 How Race Impacts on Sex Offender Research, Assessment and Treatment

There is an almost total absence of knowledge regarding sex offenders who come from minority sub-cultures. Sexual crimes are less likely to be reported in minority communities and minority offenders are even less likely to seek treatment than white offenders. This presentation will offer some historical perspectives on the etiology of sex offenses among blacks and Hispanics, and propose that such offenses are frequently NOT the result of a paraphilia. Some suggestions are offered to make treatment more meaningful and effective for minority clients.

## D2 Psychometric Properties of the Abel-Blasingame Assessment System for the Intellectually Disabled™

This presentation provides psychometric data on the Abel-Blasingame Assessment System for the Intellectually Disabled (ABID), and based on n=900+ adult male subjects. The presenters will discuss the development of the ABID, the internal reliabilities of separate scales and validity data. We will also provide frequencies of sixteen sexual behaviors and the crossing of diagnosis in the ID population that are of interest to treatment providers, case managers and supervising personnel.

## D3 Cybersex Offenders: Assessment and Treatment

This presentation will give an overview of sex and the internet, including general and teen statistics, legal issues, viewing (or making) child pornography vs. chat rooms, and debunking some of the myths about cybersex. Assessment of the cybersex offender, both relative to risk and treatment will be covered, including statistical information, use of statistical instruments and data if there is also child molestation and what instruments are available and appropriate if the offender has only offended on line. Clinical and miscellaneous factors to consider both for a risk assessment and for a treatment assessment will also be covered, with information gathering forms presented. Treatment recommendations will include important components, such as including medications, collateral resources, and collaboration with appropriate individuals and agencies.

## D4 Implications of Emerging Research and its Application in the Treatment of Juvenile Sexually Abusive Behavior

Neurobiological research and theory give us a deeper understanding of juvenile sexually abusive behavior as well as implication for its treatment. Treating juveniles who have acted in sexually abusive ways requires interventions that attend to underlying emotional and behavioral dysregulation. Dysregulation can be due to both developmental deficits as well as maturational processes, which occur both in the brains and in the minds of our clients. This discussion concerns some of the important neurological and development issues that can contribute to juvenile sexually abusive behavior. Emotional and behavioral dysregulation, a symptom of brain abnormalities resulting from unresolved trauma, requires several different levels of intervention. Management of strong negative emotions and impulses using cognitive/behavioral restructuring, arousal reduction (covert sensitization) are all designed to stop offending behavior.

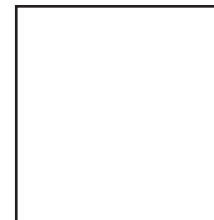
